Where possible, a back garden is normally safer than the front as it is away from traffic.

Write a story about a superhero who stops a child from running into the road to rescue the ball. Who would be the safest person to get the ball back? (Hint – it's not the superhero). Could the superhero show the child who that person is?

A few suggestions of things to do in your garden:

Use chalk to draw rainbows and other pictures on patios. (Don't worry it washes away in the rain).

Ask an adult for a clean paintbrush, (the ground needs to be dry) using clean water 'paint' a picture on a patio or wall. The finer the brush the more detailed picture you can do... but you must work fast before it dries and disappears.

Lie on the ground and look up at the clouds. Can you see any shapes that you could make in to characters or pictures? Perhaps you could draw this on to some paper.
